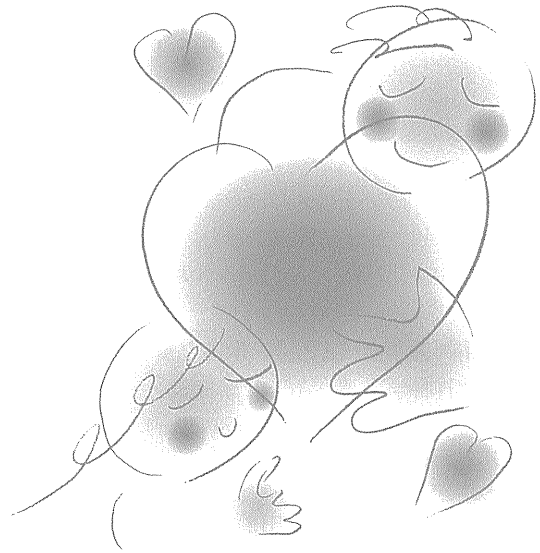
チルドレンズ・ナショナル・メディカルセンター精神医学・行動科学・小児科部門 助教授。

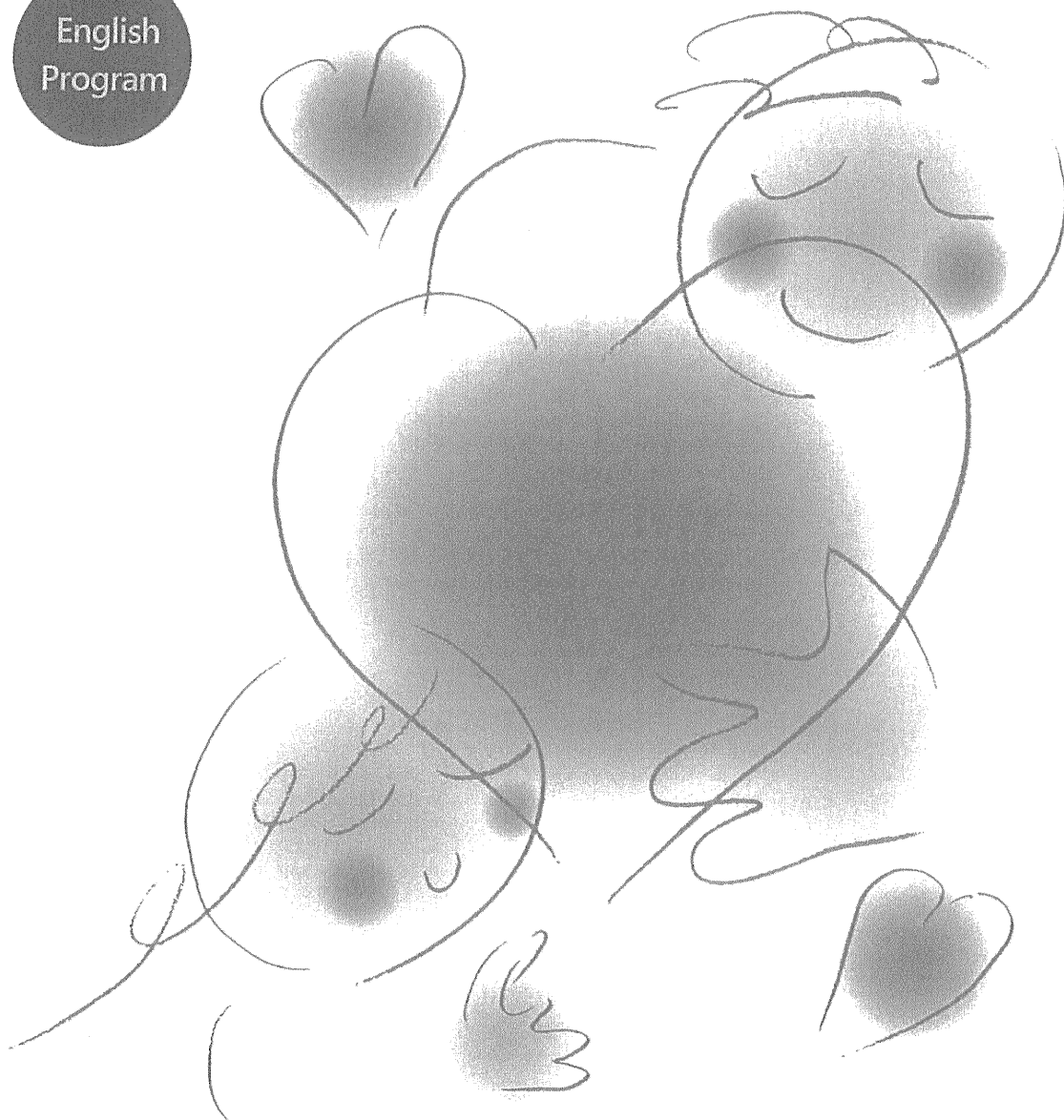

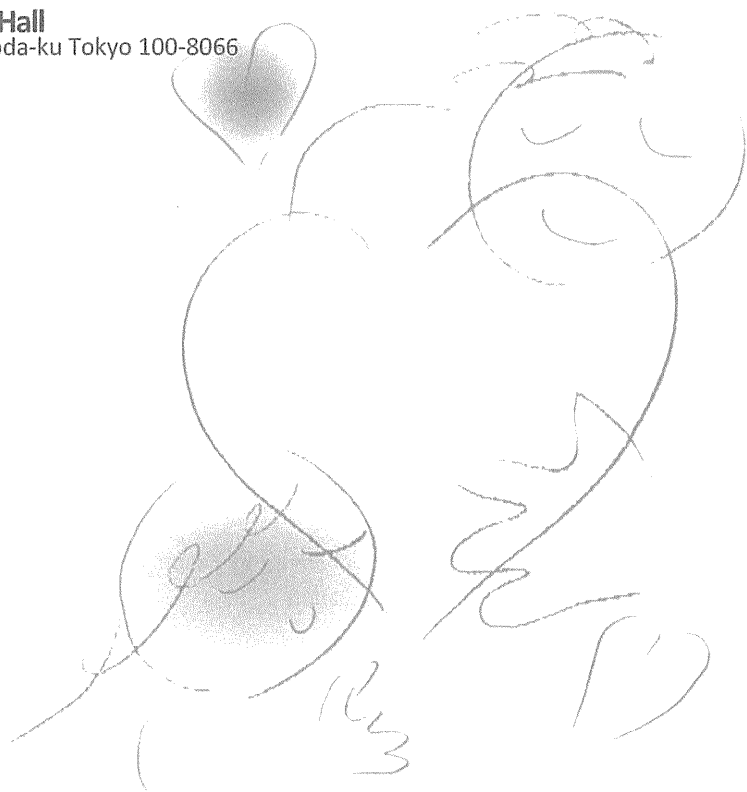

Dean Ajdukovic, Ph.D. <Croatia>

Dean Ajduković, Ph.D., is a professor of psychology at the Department of Psychology, University of Zagreb, Croatia. He served as department chairperson and director of the Doctoral Psychology Program. His extensive experience covers working with displaced populations, victims of organized violence, social reconstruction of post-conflict communities, community-based mental health and psychosocial interventions, project evaluation and family violence. He directed over 30 research and intervention projects, lectured in a number of centers of excellence in US and Europe, and published over 150 papers in peer reviewed journals and books. His books and papers were published in Croatian, English, Macedonian, Russian and Albanian. He serves as consultant and trainer on psychosocial program development and evaluation, refugee issues, children and youth violence, NGO strengthening, community crisis interventions and treatment of perpetrators of domestic violence. He has consulted in countries affected by upheaval such as Bosnia Herzegovina, Serbia, Kosovo, Albania, Russia, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Ingushetia. He serves as a reviewer for a dozen international professional journals. He organized several major European professional conferences and served on their program committees. He served as president (1993-2013) of the Society for Psychological Assistance (SPA), a regional mental health NGO based in Zagreb; member of the Council of the International Society for Health and Human Rights (ISHHR, 1998-2011); president (2003-2005) and Board member (1997-2007) of the European Society for Traumatic Stress Studies (ESTSS). He is president of the Croatian Society for Traumatic Stress. In 2011 he received the European award *Walter de Loos for Excellence in European Trauma Work*.
